Mayor of Congleton Cllr. Margaret Gartside and President Kevin opened the New Life Nursery Sensory Room on Sunday, 12th February. The Sensory Room provides a peaceful haven where children with additional needs such as autism can explore and experience soothing lights and sounds and different surfaces. It is a calming area where a child can regulate its emotions.

Chair of the Trustees of New Life Church, Stephen Hodgkinson thanked the Mayor for her encouragement and support to follow the dream of developing the room and to the Congleton Town Trust for their financial support. Rotary had also helped with the development of the room in several ways, including returning all moneys raised through the nursery's sponsored Bikeathon cycle ride and, more recently a further grant of £500 to assist with completion of the room.

Alison Timbey, nursery manager, said that there was a growing need for sensory spaces. The room would be used by all children but would be particularly beneficial to children with complex needs as well as others with speech and language development needs. She enthusiastically supports the policy of inclusion, where children with special educational needs (SEND) are integrated with their peer groups into local schools. All children should be able to access provision, it helps them to see their role models and also to be accepted by them, she continued. As many as 20 percent of their pre school children have complex special educational needs, she said.

Mr Hodgkinson said that the New Life Church's role extended to helping all families experiencing difficulty. The Church helps all needy groups including assisting older people to find employment and also with support through their food bank. All of their activity is designed, ultimately, to help children's development in the family, he continued.

Reflecting the growing need to provide for SEND children in society, the club has also supported other similar schemes in the area. Kevin said that the club is focused on helping young people through its support of similar schemes as well as through its active youth programme offered to all primary and secondary schools in its area.

Leader of the environmental team, David Brew is passionate about the state of the planet, David said that the club could do nothing about the 8 million tonnes of plastic going into the oceans every day, and the millions of birds lost in recent years. Still, it can help educate and influence the young folk of Congleton for the longer-term benefit of the town. For example, the club will work with young pupils in schools to help them participate in the annual Congleton in Bloom event. The environment group will work alongside Rotary's existing commitment to young people through its youth programme.

Daven School

Pruning the fruit trees has been completed. The overgrown poly tunnel area has been cleared and slabs laid to provide a safe path for the children. Raised boxes have been placed and now await compost, ready for planting in

The outside raised growing bed has been covered with weed suppressant fabric and is ready for planting. Rotary intends to supply the school with some pots, compost and runner bean seeds etc., to start the planting. The poly tunnel is now ready for the school

The team has agreed to assist the school in a hedge planting project at the front of the school. This is a 'Trees 4 Congleton' project but we are keen to assist other groups. More Rotarians will be asked for

Memorial tree

The tree has been planted at Astbury Golf Club and the memorial sign has been made and delivered. A ceremony will take place shortly.

Woodcocks Well now even better,

The overgrown bed to the front of the Woodcocks Well school and the raised growing bed on the other side of the road has been cleared. The front bed will be planted with existing potted fuschias and lavenders in spring.

The team intends to supply the school's raised bed with some pots, compost and runner bean seeds for indoor sowing in April and planting out in May.

Scholar Greener?

The team was asked to clear a very overgrown area to the side of the Scholar Green school to make the area manageable for existing staff. The team cleared the site of brambles and pruned the fruit trees, raked the area and left two areas as wildlife refuges.

Watch the Birdies

An on site meeting has taken place with RSPB advisors regarding bird feeders and nest boxes in Congleton Park – intended to bring more wild birds into the area. A proposal has been submitted for supplying, fitting and maintaining 20 nest boxes and 6 bird feeders. Eddie Rush has agreed to supply and cut the wood to the RSPB specification with Rotary members involved in assembly of the boxes.



Ukraine again



A local charity set up to help Ukrainian refugees has just received a further grant of £4,500 offered by District and delivered by lan Robinson our international officer.

Paul Nixon from CAUSN (Congleton Area Ukraine Support Network) received the cheque from Ian. The money comes from Rotary Foundation, our international charity that funds much of Rotary's work around the globe.

CAUSN now supports around 175 Ukrainians in hosted families in the area. As their initial hosted period comes to its end, many now want a more permanent arrangement and are looking to move into rented accommodation on their own. The problems for CAUSN have not gone away, they have changed in their complexity; finding the right landlords, arranging guarantors and furnishing the properties with all the basic needs!

Paul Nixon, CAUSN's director said that one of the biggest problems is the language barrier. Without a command of english our Ukrainians could not communicate, receive education or get work.

Last year, Rotary funds initially supported language education, but one-to-one sessions are both the most expensive – and most successful! This next grant will provide more language training and also assist with families' needs as they move into more settled accommodation and become self-supporting.



A Strong Rotary Foundation



Patrick Tyrrell, our District Rotary Foundation Co-ordinator, came to talk about Rotary Foundation -Rotary's own global charity funded largely by subscriptions, donations and bequests from Rotarians. Patrick explained how the Foundation garners its funds and uses them often with match-funding - to support Rotary's campaigns through District and Global funding.

He congratulated Congleton on achieving the second-highest per-capita contribution level in District. Rotary's 1.2m members worldwide had helped build a fund of \$1.2bn to fund scholarships (with many recipients going on to work in organisations such as the United Nations), 'End Polio Now' and grants. old School House

Madison gets a result

Five-year-old Madison has Autism and Sensory Processing Disorder (SPD), as well as a number of other undiagnosed medical needs. Madison was given a life-changing buggy thanks to a grant of £691 from Rotary-Congleton and the charity, Children Today. Madison had outgrown her standard buggy, but because she is prone to running off and has limited danger awareness due to her condition, her parents felt they needed a specialist buggy for Madison's safety.

Her mum, Lauren Gartside, says: "The buggy we were using for Madison was much too small for her and it was a struggle to push as it wasn't suitable for an older child.

"It had got to the point that I couldn't go out with Madison on my own, because she could easily unclip herself in the old buggy. After several incidents of her getting out and running off, I was in constant fear that she could escape. It just wasn't safe."

Since receiving a specialist buggy, designed for older children, the family has described how it has given them a whole new lease of life and peace of mind.

Lauren continues:

"I can't describe how much of a difference this new buggy has had. It's made our lives so much easier and we can go to more places that simply weren't an option before. We've even had a successful trip to the zoo!


