Will Jennie go further?

Jennie Cook swam 137 lengths for Swimathon last year and aims to do better this time! Jennie is no newcomer to swimming. She is a previous channel swimmer and runs her Knypersley business, 'Swim Hub'. A trained instructor with 23 year's experience of teaching children with special needs, she now concentrates on teaching people to swim in small pre-booked groups in her 10m pool.

Keeping the heat at 34 degrees, the pool is ideal for infants and children with special needs as well as older people who do not want to be seen learning in the bigger pools at Leisure Centres. Groups are limited to 8 people and each session is supervised by 2 instructors and costs just £8.

Meanwhile, Jennie is in training for a solo swim and is enthusiastic about supporting the event.



WAG'S WITH VISYON

Swimathon attracts up to 60 teams, each swimming for the charity of their choice, chosen for a variety of reasons – some intensely personal.

One such is the WAGs team. Not what you think, these WAGs (it stands for Women of Astbury Group) is local. The group's leader is Barbara Burney and the girls have decided to support this event because of the charities who will benefit.

Jude Rouse, one of the WAG's members is leading a Swimathon team to raise money for Visyon, the local charity helping young people to cope with their issues. She is swimming in memory of her son and wishes that she had known of Visyon and its work when her son was struggling. At the time there was no one to turn to for help with his complex needs.

The WAGs initially expected to raise £300, but now confidently, Jude expects them to beat their target.

Jude, supported by her husband Dave, and daughter Vicky are no strangers to swimming. Together with her husband and daughter, she swam the 2018 Great North Swim across Windermere whilst she has also entered the Swimathon with other teams before.

Two more WAG ladies (including our own Sandra) are swimming out of a total of 12 in the group. They will swim at 8pm on Friday 10th March.

ANOTHER CLASSIC SHOW THIS YEAR

Sunday, July 23rd is a date for all petrolheads to have in their diaries! The Rotary Classic Car show is making a return to the Egerton Arms field. There will be some changes to make the event more family-friendly. Jo Hodgkinson, Senior Sister, said that a stay in hospital can become boring. Having the radios will help the days go by.


Ukraine - a local update

Rotary-Congleton has been one of the most active clubs in procuring money distributed by District to help Ukrainians in our area. Quite separately, we also raised money locally to support the Moschun appeal by Rotary-Kyiv to provide modular housing.

Congleton is now supporting 175 Ukrainian visitors, resident the area. How they got here, the detailed management required and what is happening to them now is a remarkable story. Paul Nixon, one of the key organisers is coming to tell us about it on April 17th.

Incidentally, Paul and his wife Lucy also opened their home in Marton to two sisters who fled the conflict. Taya is a talented saxophonist student, her sister an IT specialist.
