Rotary provided marshals to assist the town council staff in controlling traffic and providing a visible presence in the park. Over 100 local residents signed The Pledge including the Mayor of Congleton Cllr. Margaret Gartside and local MP. Fiona Bruce. The Pledge involves signatories in promising to consider 10 simple steps, which taken daily, will help to reduce unnecessary use of plastics, and cut down pollution.

The team also provided cups of hot chocolate and coffee throughout the afternoon – all for the price of a voluntary donation.

A Treat in Store for Homeless Tits and Robins!

Rotary Bird Boxes are destined for Congleton Park.

Destined to be supplied and fitted high in the woodland in Congleton Park, these bird boxes were being assembled by our doubty team of Rotarians. The bird boxes are designed for tits and robins.

The boxes – manufactured to RSPB specification - are intended to attract more wild birds into our urban environment. Simon Fallis said that whilst it might appear to be a little late, the garden birds may have several broods during a season – and are not limited to one nesting place. Once inhabited, the birds will return to the boxes year after year. He explained that the bird boxes are part of Rotary's growing commitment to supporting the environment.

185 Ukrainian Refugees – a Local Triumph!



Paul Nixon told a Rotary-Congleton meeting about the work of CAUSN - the Congleton Area Ukrainian Support Network – assisting 185 Ukrainian refugees in the Congleton area. CAUSN, under Paul Nixon's leadership had established a comprehensive and detailed plan to support the refugees. This included finding hosting families and matching them carefully to the visitors and also in some cases finding vacant properties for families. His team had to overcome a multitude of problems including getting visas, organising clothing, doctors, dentists, school uniforms, schools and benefits packages. CAUSN established a clothing boutique and furniture warehousing and was even able to supply laptops.

Mr Nixon described the central problem of ensuring that the refugees had a basic knowledge of english. Providing english lessons not only made schooling possible, but allowed adults to find work and so ensured that these proud European people were able to support themselves, rather than relying on benefits. In several cases, this resulted in refugees being able to move from living with hosts to independent living in their own rented properties.

An increasing problem for the group is in finding houses and landlords who are prepared to take

the visitors with support from CAUSN avoiding many of the usual background checks.

Rotary guests at the meeting were Feliks and Artem Tytarenko, a father and son who had benefited from the support given by a dedicated team of CAUSN helpers, four of whom were also present at the meeting. Mr Tytarenko, who works for the Ukrainian government and regularly travels back to his homeland, spoke from his heart of the support and friendship that English people had provided his nation, making the point that the support had saved the lives of many of his countryfolk and made front line troops content in the knowledge that their families were safe.

Rotary-Congleton had been able to secure two grants from the Rotary Foundation to assist CAUSN and Mr Nixon heaped praise on the club for supporting around 40% of its fundraising activity over the last year.





Rotary-Congleton president Kevin Thompson presented Paul Nixon with a further cheque from the club for £2,200 to enable more one-to-one english training for Ukrainian refugees. This has proved to be the best and most cost-effective way of ensuring that the visitors are equipped to support themselves, rather than relying on benefits and being a burden on the state.



Ukrainian student's solo Saxophone stuns

Tasiia Holovko entertained Rotarians and their friends with a stunning solo performance on her saxophone.

'Taya' and her sister are refugee guests of Paul Nixon and his wife Lucy, who live in Marton. She is a third-year student at Kyiv University, but through the Congleton Area Ukrainian Support Network's connections has also been able to pursue her studies at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester.

Several Rotarians had heard her perform at the Clonter Opera's 'Concert for Ukraine' earlier in the year, when together with other Ukrainian musicians, she had helped to raise money for the Ukrainian refugees in Congleton and also to send money to the Rotary campaign to build modular homes for homeless families in Moschun, north of Kyiv.



Rotary guest spoke from the heart

Feliks Tytarenko, a Ukrainian refugee living in Congleton, works for the Ukrainian government and regularly travels back to his homeland. His home was attacked by the Russians on February 27th last year. He spoke from his heart at a recent Rotary meeting. He told of the support and friendship that English people had provided his family and his nation, making the point that this support had saved the lives of many of his countryfolk and made front line troops content in the knowledge that their families were safe and being protected and looked after.

The highest award that Rotary can bestow – the coveted Paul Harris Fellowship, given in the name of Rotary's Founder – was awarded to past-president Stewart Price. His enthusiasm and dedication was maintained throughout his presidency, extended to two-years due to Covid. He steered the club through the pandemic, not only ensuring its survival, when many local clubs were being forced to close, but also succeeding in sustaining a fundraising programme, earning money for community support during the lockdown!

John Gauld, the Congleton club's marketing and communications officer received a Certificate of Appreciation signed by the President of Rotary International for marketing work raising awareness in Rotary and helping to grow membership through the promotion of its activities.

Eddie Rush received a Certificate of Appreciation for his unstinting support of the club through his generous and longstanding involvement and background work in preparing the groundwork for many of the club's public events.
