CONGLETON ROTARY CELEBRATES GLORIOUS YEARS OF SERVICE TO OUR COMMUNITY 1947-2023



On Monday, 20th November, around 120 Rotary-Congleton members, partners, guests and friends turned out in force to celebrate the granting of the Rotary Charter to the Congleton club, exactly 76 years ago.

The Charter celebration dinner was held at the Sandhole Farm Oak Barn. Rotary-Congleton's president, Brian Hogan stressed the club's role providing service to the community – the theme of the evening. The Mayor and Mayoress of Congleton attended the event.

Musical entertainment was provided before dinner by two young stars from Eaton Bank Academy, Freya and guitarist Lilia, accompanied by their teacher Miss Sophie Walker, Other pupils from EBA entertained with drama, singing, aerobic and gymnastic performances.

Brian commented on the club's 76 years in Congleton. He said, 'During those 76 years many Rotarians have given service to the club and the community. The Rotary motto is 'Service above Self' and that says a lot about the kind of people that join and belong to Rotary. The Club has introduced over the years many innovative fundraising initiatives such as the Bonfire and Fireworks Display and Swimathon which are raising significant amounts of money which allow us to support good causes and charities in the community. The innovation continues with our environmental team who are undertaking a lot of work in the community as well as working closely with the Town Council. Past initiatives such as the Tree of light project are also being revitalised, demonstrating the level of service being given by our members to the community.'

Assistant District Governor Rtn. Edwin Partridge praised the exemplary work of the Congleton club in building its membership and its outstanding contribution to the life of the community, going on the cite the full programme of events organised by the club and praising the £45,000 spent last year supporting worthy causes, including schools, young people, as well as disabled and disadvantaged people

Entertainment was provided by accomplished after-dinner speaker and comic, Austin Knight. Mr Knight spent 11 years as an entertainer travelling the world on some of the most prestigious cruise ships ever built.



At a short ceremony, held in the bitterly cold in the community garden on Saturday, November 25th, the Tree of Light was switched on and will remain lit until twelfth night, festooned with wooden shaped decorations with personal and seasonal messages.

The Beartown Choir led a performance lasting nearly an hour, singing all the best-known traditional Christmas Carols. They sat in the Community Gardens in the clear, but cold afternoon light. The carols were introduced by compere, Rtn. Doug Parker, appropriately dressed in

Edwardian costumé.

Tracy Heyes and Richard Lingard both read short seasonal poems. Organiser, Jo Lancaster told the audience of the aims of the Tree of Light and how it is changing to reflect both the economic times and the need to embrace a more environmental theme, with recyclable lightweight wooden shapes, able to be hung for the first time on the growing tree. Rotary-Congleton president, Brian Hogan reminded everyone of the history of the tree, dedicated to the memory of Alan Parton, who brought the tree of light to Congleton. Mayor of Congleton Cllr. Rob Moreton acknowledged the hard working Rotarians and the support that this venture and others give to the community before the tree was lit for

another year. A thoughtful team from the Old Kings Arms across the road, turned up with an impromptu supply of hot tea, which they dispensed free of charge

to the grateful crowd.

The five shapes can still be purchased from the Information Centre until December 22nd when the last ones will be hung on the tree. They are priced with a suggested minimum donation of just £1.



















Congleton gets its Swimathon back next year!

The recently opened Congleton Leisure Centre will host the popular Rotary Swimathon event on Friday 15th and Saturday 16th March in 2024. This is a special occasion, marking the return of Swimathon to Congleton and the first in the new pool. The event is an important fundraiser for local charities.

While the Congleton Leisure Centre was being rebuilt, the Swimathon event moved to Biddulph. While the facilities at Biddulph Leisure Centre were superb, the distance from Congleton meant that it was more difficult for several of the 'regular' Congleton teams to travel. For 2024, the event is back in Congleton.

Organisers, Sandra Conway and Rachel Brown say 'it's not too soon to start thinking about building a team and entering. Booking and sponsorship forms are available now on the dedicated Swimathon website. Booking early means that teams get first choice of their preferred day and time.' said Sandra.

Swimathon is a unique event that benefits all who take part. It encourages fitness and good heath; it raises money for charities of the swimmers' choice and the whole of the remaining 50% of the monies raised go to Rotary's chosen causes. For 2024, the beneficiaries will be The Old Saw Mill and Listening Out Loud.

Listening Out Loud has recently opened a cafe and charity shop in Congleton. The aims of the Foundation are to assist exservicemen and women and support their wellbeing. The charity, based in Congleton, was set up in 2012 to support veterans affected by homelessness and mental health issues.

The Old Saw Mill works to enhance the lives of people who are socially isolated, lonely and in need of additional support. It provides a meeting place for groups of people with challenging problems and seeks to give stimulation by crafting, singing or simply having fun.

Every year, Rotary-Congleton runs a programme of youth activities for the 16 local primary and two secondary schools that fall within its catchment area. The programme is part of an international commitment to an educational programme supporting schools and youth, involving every Rotary club in 200 countries throughout the world.

In Congleton, the programme is organised by its youth activities co-ordinator, Eric Westwood who earlier this year, visited every school to determine their needs and to assure them of Rotary's support across a number of areas, including the increasingly popular environmental education and support for sensory rooms for pupils with special educational needs (SEN) now being taught in the community.

Specific activities including four competitions; Young Photographer, Young Artist, Young Chef and Youth Speaks fall under Eric Westwood's specific jurisdiction, together with a major fundraiser, 'Swimathon' and a young citizen's award scheme called 'Stars of the Future.'

'Taken together, the youth programme represents a major investment by Rotary-Congleton in the area's youth, of which many local people may not be aware,' said Eric Westwood.

Young Photographer 2023 is presently underway, with most local schools already committed to participate. Open to pupils from 7 to 17, there is an overall winner with prizes presented in each participating school. Every year there is an exhibition in the Town Library over the Christmas holiday. Young Artist runs in the springtime and is so popular that the number of entries is restricted for each school! Nevertheless, earlier this year over 500 entries posed a serious problem for the judges. Prizes are awarded to the winners at each

This is the editorial for a feature article printed in The Congleton Chronicle in November outlining the commitment made to every child in our community.

Young Chef, similarly is just starting with both Congleton senior schools taking part in the local heats with the winners moving on to compete at Rotary's Northwest District and National levels if they progress through. The two local schools compete initially with their young chefs organising a menu and cooking a meal to decide who represents their school. Each year the Rotary's Eric Capper trophy is awarded alternatively to the winner from each school. Last year the team from Congleton High School were runners-up in the District competition. Eric Westwood runs this and Rotary supports the entrants with all their costs and also awards prizes and certificates.

Youth Speaks is run for the two secondary schools and this year Congleton High School are raring to go! Basically, a team of three has to speak on a subject of their choice, sum up and answer questions. Winners go forward to the District heat and if successful on to the National final.

Swimathon is a major event in the Rotary calendar that is supported by many local schools. It is also open to other youth groups, individual teams and local businesses. Teams obtain their own sponsorship, which is split 50/50 between a charity of their choice and Rotary's own two nominated recipients. Next year, the event will return to Congleton Leisure Centre for the first time after its rebuild. The event takes place on 15th and 16th March 2024. Every swimmer receives a medal. There's still time to enter a team with full information online at

Stars of the Future is an open offer to schools to nominate and recognise an individual pupil or a team that has done something special. Each winner is presented with a framed certificate, a medal and a prize.
